#### Vicar's letter

I'm confused. One of the great benefits for a lazy shopper at Christmas used to be arranging for fresh narcissi to be posted from the Scillies to friends and family up the country. You could rely on Spring taking its time to reach other parts of the country. Nowadays the seasons seem to have got themselves in a muddle and we don't know where we are. Last year I was given a pot of daffodil bulbs which I enjoyed and then, their job done, hid in an out-of-sight corner of the garden and forgot. The seasons turned and months later - it must have been before Christmas - I discovered the bulbs I had discarded had burst out into new life. Yes, before Christmas, just in time to be bowed and shrivelled by the great freeze which made many of us prisoners in own homes last month. Each frozen morning they made a miserable picture yet, as each day wore on, the daffodils pulled themselves together and grew upright until they looked as fresh and glorious as on the day the buds first unfolded into flower.

And they are still doing so; those daffodils are still in their pot on my patio table giving me a lift as I draw back the curtains each morning.

I leave you to draw what lessons from that little parable you choose: I am onto Hot Cross Buns. They used to be a treat to look forward to at Easter but now they seem to be as freely available as pasties or cut bread. I was given a pack of supermarket buns this weekend by a friend who knows my complete loss of willpower when they are put in front of me. These did not remain long in front of me. And yet I know I shouldn't:

Good Friday come this month, the old woman runs With one or two a penny hot cross buns.

Yes, I know Good Friday is actually at the start of April this year and Ash Wednesday not until the middle of this month, but just as I don't open my Christmas presents until Christmas morning, I shall try to put off indulging my love of Hot Cross Buns until Easter, until Good Friday, the traditional day. Then:

"Half for you and half for me, Between us two shall goodwill be."

As I look in my diary to the next few weeks, I am reminded how times and seasons and anniversaries do matter - even if only the church seems to remember them nowadays. So, what will you be giving up this Lent? Or - better - what might you be aiming to *take up* this Lent? Perhaps you can come to a determination to make a daily quiet time for yourself, maybe with the help of one of the many books of readings or reflections that are available - or a resolve to share at one of our Wednesday Parish Communions through the six weeks of Lent. The ashes of Ash Wednesday soon wash off but the discipline of a regular Lenten observance lends meaning to the celebration of Easter Day.

I don't have the knack of telling jokes effectively so let's see how this one works in print. The words of a wise cleric: 'I always make the same resolution and I have never once broken it: every year I resolve to give something up for Lent and then when Lent comes I give up my New Year's resolution.'

#### St Valentine

There are two confusing things about this day of romance and anonymous love-cards strewn with lace, cupids and ribbon: firstly, there seems to have been two different Valentines in the 4th century - one a priest martyred on the Flaminian Way, under the emperor Claudius, the other a bishop of Terni martyred at Rome. And neither seems to have had any clear connection with lovers or courting couples.

So why has Valentine become the patron saint of romantic love? By Chaucer's time the link was assumed to be because on this saint's day - 14th February - the birds are supposed to pair. Or perhaps the custom of seeking a partner on St Valentine's Day is a surviving scrap of the old Roman Lupercalia festival, which took place in the middle of February. One of the Roman gods



honoured during this Festival was Pan, the god of nature. Another was Juno, the goddess of women and marriage. During the Lupercalia it was a popular custom for young men to draw the name of a young unmarried woman from a name-box. The two would then be partners or 'sweethearts' during the time of the celebrations. Even modern Valentine decorations bear an ancient symbol of love - Roman cupids with their bows and love-arrows.

There are no churches in England dedicated to Valentine, but since 1835 his relics have been claimed by the Carmelite church in Dublin.

#### The very first Valentine card - a legend

The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage.

A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could - until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison waiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14 February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.'

So the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers.

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



#### Excerpt from A Story of Carn Brea, 1863 By John Harris (a Cornish miner)


A Christian had been buried, one whose gifts Were great in secret, whose heart-prayers were made More in the closet than the crowded church; Who spoke with pity to the lowest hind, And wiped the tear from Sorrow's soften'd face; Who call'd the children round him when the day Expired in purple o'er the forest falls, And told them tales, and fed upon their smiles, Laugh'd with their laugh, and shouted with their shout, Mingling the lays of age with early life; Then led them far beyond the reefs of time. He stood between the oppressor and oppress'd, Healing the wounds which cruelty had made. He sought the bed of sickness, and, when found, Refresh'd the sufferer with his purse and prayer. With liberal hands he wrought most liberal things. The widow found in him a constant friend. The wandering orphan, shivering through the world, Ne'er stopp'd in vain before the good man's gate. His bounty, like the sky-lark's joyous song, Gladden'd the hearts of all within its range. He stoop'd to wretchedness, and, with kind words And kinder deeds, lighten'd the grey-hair'd man. Familiar was he with Dame Nature's laws, Nor seal'd her book of wonders; but his soul Held endless converse with the Eternal Word. Messiah was his pattern. Morn and eve, And busy noontide, found him toiling on In the Redeemer's footprints. By his life He preach'd the Saviour to the multitude, And cried to all, "Walk in the narrow way." He stood among his fellows like a tree, Of foliage rare and verdure beautiful, Whose summer greenness never knew decay.



#### More about ~

#### Tim Thornton ~ Fifteenth Bishop of Truro

Bishop Tim was twenty-three when, in 1980, he was ordained Deacon in Wakefield Cathedral. But it was some seven years earlier, in the hills of Burgundy, when he first became aware that God was calling him. Here, in the spiritual buzz of the Taizé summer camp, he began to explore the vocation which has brought him to us in Cornwall.



Growing up in a Devonshire vicarage, Tim was well used to the clerical life, and moved naturally from Devonport High School to Southampton University and thence to St Stephen's House Oxford where he trained for the ministry. A number of appointments followed, but always in the background was the support and encouragement of his erstwhile mentor, David Hope. Hope (now Baron Hope of Thornes) had been Principal of St Stephen's House, but was translated to Wakefield as Bishop, where his friendship with the young Tim Thornton was further cemented. When Hope succeeded Graham Leonard as Bishop of London, he took Tim with him and they continued to work together until Hope's elevation to the Archbishopric of York in 1995. Over the next few years Tim Thornton engaged in important work in the London diocese before returning to the westcountry first as Bishop of Sherborne in 2001 and thence, sensibly, onward to Truro last year.

Bishop Tim told me that throughout his ministry, he has tried to keep his focus God centred at all times. God is both the source of his inspiration and the direction of his teaching. His faith drives him to share with others the joys of a Christian life, and to strive at all times toward a society that is both just and fair. His deepest satisfaction comes "when worship goes well, people grow in their faith and we all develop towards mature disciples of our Lord". His ambition for this diocese is to see "more people responding to the call of Jesus, and more connection between our churches and the communities they serve". His special message to us in St Mylor is that we might all "become the disciples God calls us to be".

It was hard to unearth any vices in such a man, but he is capable of supporting the wrong Rugby football teams (which he does with some enthusiasm), and he did admit to a predeliction for "watching rubbish TV". He likes to keep fit, enjoys walking with his wife Sian (whom he describes as an excellent cook – although he sometimes chooses to pass on the puddings), and enjoys occasional breaks with her in their Bosham retreat. He is very much looking forward to his visit to St Mylor on 28<sup>th</sup> of February.
